



The unlikely link of Ash Wednesday and Valentine's Day ...

During this month Ash Wednesday and Valentine's Day, share the same date! It seems an odd mix, yet there is an obvious link: love! Lent, beginning on Ash Wednesday, is about learning how to love God more, as we give Him space in our lives.

Jesus was led into the desert by the Spirit (1), where He was tempted by Satan, but demonstrated the path of real love.

Jesus is tempted to turn stones into bread. Love gets to the heart of human need, not just satisfying physical desires.

Satan tempts Jesus to worship him. However, worshipping God is the beginning of love and results in sacrificial service to meet the needs of others.

Finally, He is tempted to put God to the test, by jumping off the Temple. Only real love can change hearts by practical love and care.

Lent teaches us how to live out the love of God in practice, as we follow Jesus in the way of the cross.

Valentine was Christ's follower, committed to sharing God's love with others. We know little about him, except that he was a priest who lived in the 3rd Century AD and was martyred on February 14th. He also helped Christians in Rome during times of persecution and demonstrated the importance of showing real love in action.

In trying to understand the meaning of her revelations from God, Julian of Norwich found:

'What, do you wish to know your Lord's meaning in this thing? Know it well, love was his meaning.'

'Learning, Loving and Living with Jesus'



We are always very keen to maximise the children's learning time here at Inskip St. Peter's and this term our younger class, Lower School are channelling much of their their learning through the realms of an Explorers theme!

They will be studying a range of explorers from through the ages including Robert Falcon Scott the Antarctic explorer, Valentina Tereshkova the first woman to have flown in space, Christopher Columbus, Neil Armstrong and Muhammad Ibn Battuta a Moroccan scholar who widely travelled in the medieval world.

One of our highlights will be a visit by the actor Adrian Worrall who will spend the morning in class in role as one of our famous explorers come to life in Inskip! This will enable the children to be able to hear from a character themselves about what their explorations were like and he will also answer all those questions our young enquiring minds have for the famous person.

Building upon all this immersion in exploration, our younger class will be using the technical vocabulary they will encountered in order to write adventure stories about explorers and also non-fiction books about the travels of Christopher Columbus and designing a moon buggy for our explorer friend Bob to use when he explores the moon!

They will be thinking about other important people such as Florence Nightingale, Albert Einstein, William Shakespeare and Usain Bolt and discussing who is important to them in their lives and what it is that makes a person important and significant.

So including all the number skills we'll be developing through money calculations and multiplication and division, computing skills across the subjects and developing our new Charanga music curriculum it's going to be a full and fun half term!







Our Alongside-Helpers

David Winter considers a small prefix...

There are many words in modern English that begin with the prefix 'para', but nowadays undoubtedly the best-known is 'paramedic'. We all know what they do. We've seen them in their green jackets on television, at road traffic accidents and terrorist incidents, kneeling beside the wounded and dying. We've also seen their work in many TV documentaries and dramas, so that their appearance on our door-step when we've dialled 999 is both unsurprising and welcome. Over sixty years ago during my national service I was, I suppose, for a while a kind of proto-paramedic - I and my colleague Taffy (still a friend) were the emergency medical team on a large RAF station in Berkshire. We had had some training, but nothing like the level of today's paramedics.

The title intrigues me, because the 'para' bit always means something like 'with' or 'alongside'. Think of parallel lines, or parachute. There's an odd example in some of our more traditional hymns, where the Holy Spirit is called the 'Paraclete'. That's taken from John's Gospel, when Jesus says He would send His followers a Helper - paracletos, in Greek. Split into its two parts, it simply means 'alongside helper', which is how for years I have thought of the Holy Spirit. A paramedic is literally someone who's also an 'alongside helper' at moments of great need. So green jackets with PARACLETE on their backs? There's a 'thought for the day'!

How to improve your memory

Don't forget to eat your greens – or you could be forgetting a lot of other things as well. It seems that a portion of green leafy vegetables each day can go a long way towards safeguarding the memory of older people. In a recent study, it was found that people who eat greens regularly can have a memory capacity equivalent to the memory of a person 11 years younger.

A recent study at Rush University Medical Centre in Chicago found that people in their 80s who ate just half a cup a day of certain green leafy vegetables (lettuce, spinach, kale and collard greens; all rich in vitamin K) had significantly better memory than those older people who did not.
